## Kateřina Houšková – Anna Schránilová – Matyáš Kracík Hospitals Na Bulovce and Na Homolce. Contribution of the 1980s to the architecture of the Prague hospital premises

## **ANNOTATION**

This article concerns the history and subsequently the reality of Bohemian, resp. Prague, architecture designed for medical purposes, until the end of the 1980s.2 The authors selected two large hospital premises in Prague, which in their opinion are both well preserved and remarkable. The selection thus covers the most significant realisations of hospital architecture in Prague in the 1980s, which includes three new pavilions within the Na Bulovce hospital complex (from the late 1970s to 1989) and the complex of the prominent hospital Na Homolce, in service since 1989, which soon afterwards was transformed to a classic state facility.

## **SUMMARY**

The three authors of this article present three well-nigh unpublished Prague hospital buildings: three pavilions within the Na Bulovce Hospital premise in Libeň and the Na Homolce Hospital complex in Motol. The building history of these features is described and their authorship is discussed in greater detail together with the role of the Zdravoprojekt, the state project organisation – specialised department for projecting medical facilities, active in 1953–1992. Also the reflexion of these buildings in the press of the period is mentioned. Each building is presented in the context of the architecture of the period and its exterior is described, as well as the interior in more detail with preserved or not preserved original furnishing, including the works of art. Also the heritage value of the buildings is evaluated with a potential of a suitable form of a more consistent heritage protection.

The history of large hospital premises in Prague is outlined in the introduction from their beginnings to the present day. Medical architecture from the 1980s still stands on the edge of scientific research of the architecture of the 2nd half of the 20th century, which is reflected by the sparse mentions in the bibliography of the period and today. Although the features presented in this article have received little discussion previously, it doesn't mean, that their quality is low. The research of this period has received an added value of the possibility of consultation with still living architects (the author of the radiotherapy pavilion at Bulovka Ing. arch. Josef Sedloň, and the collective of authors of the Na Homolce Hospital lead by Ing. arch. Petr Kutnar) or the artists (the potter Veronika Oleríny or Tamara Divíšková).

The orthopaedic pavilion in the Bulovka complex from the 1970s is briefly presented (Vladimír Černický architect, 1975–1978), which precedes the researched period of the 1980s and 1990s. The neighbouring gynaecological-maternity pavilion of a correlative style is described in more detail (Adolf Pospíšil, 1982–1986), together with the radiotherapy pavilion on the top of the building site (Josef Sedloň, 1983–1989).

The gynaecological-maternity pavilion is a moderately elegant building, which follows the style of currently standing features in the hospital and mainly of the neighbouring, slightly earlier orthopaedic pavilion by Vladimír Černický. Large amount of art work, preserved in both buildings, gives evidence of the original generous conception (from more varied materials in the orthopaedic pavilion, i. e. glass objects, reliefs and tapestries); sculptural art is accented more in the gynaecological-maternity pavilion (relief walls, ceramic reliefs). The pavilion of radiation oncology added to the already existing Radio Therapeutic Institute has been realised only partially after 1989 (only the irradiation tract was built with a single storey building of auxiliary services). The architectural expression of the radiation oncology pavilion follows the time-tested principals of the modern architecture. The long period from the proposal to realisation caused the style of the building to correspond more with the slightly earlier architecture. Numerous art decorations in the interior are mainly of textile material (tapestries) and a remarkable glassed atrium with extensive ceramic decoration in the basement.

The complex of the former State Institute of the national health (SÚNZ) Prague-Motol, today The Na Homolce Hospital, was built in 1982–1989 after the project of the architect team Petr Kutnar, Jana Ježková and Svatopluk Zeman from The Atelier R23 of The County Projecting Institute in Prague. The hospital is not structured with pavilions as f. e. Bulovka, but as a single block with a quite complex composition of mutually joined spaces, influenced by the north south slope of the ground, where the height difference between the entrance on the fifth

floor and the foot of the building covers four floors. The area contains several quality art works, mainly firmly joined with the architecture of the building (glass mosaics, ceramic walls and wall paintings), in the exterior as well (sculptural art).

The authors consider The Hospital Na Homolce to be the most valuable one among the presented features since its quality exceeds the others in architecture as well as with the choice of the artists involving mainly the younger generation providing a more daring style as well as applied techniques. The result was influenced by the fact, that – on the contrary from the others – it was an above-standard facility for prominent clients. Nevertheless its architectural expression and also the selection of the artists devolved from the authors of the building to a large extent. The authors would consider proclaiming Homolka a cultural monument as a compact complex untouched by a radical alteration, which would be a representative example of the architecture of its period, currently without any protection.
